My favorite comic strip? My favorite comic strip is "Calvin and Hobbs", I was like Calvin as a boy and my dog Fibber McGee was my Hobbs.

My favorite place on earth? One of my favorite places on earth was the Current and Jacks Fork rivers; it was great canoeing years ago when we were the only ones using the river. UPDATED BUILDING USE POLICIES

In accordance with local and national guidelines, Our Lord's has updated safety guidelines for attending worship and using the buildings.

We may now speak and sing all throughout both indoor and outdoor services. Please remain masked at all times when inside the Church. Masks are no longer required for outdoor services, and we are no longer checking temperatures and carrying out contact tracing. Those who are fully vaccinated may congregate indoors after in building services. Otherwise, we ask that you congregate outdoors after in building services. At the present time, we are permitting groups of 50 people or fewer to use our classrooms or fellowship halls for meetings. If everyone in the group is fully vaccinated, masks are no longer required. "Just love part 2: Just L.I.F.E. (Liberation Is For Everyone!)" Gather Bible study by Angela Khabeb

This three-session summer Bible study series is inspired, in part, by Jesus' proclamations: "If the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed" (John 8:36) and "I came that they might have life, and have it abundantly" (John 10:10).

RESURRECTED TO ETERNAL LIFE: ON DYING AND RISING

Please join in a thought-provoking book discussion on Tuesday mornings at 10 am starting June 15th. We will meet via zoom, although at some point we may decide to meet in person. Moltmann, Jurgen, Resurrected to Eternal Life: On Dying and Rising, Fortress Press, Minneapolis (2021)

"In this deeply personal and daring meditation, eminent theologian Jürgen Moltmann challenges many closely held beliefs about the experience of dying, the nature of death, and the hope of eternal life. Moving deftly between biblical, theological, and existential domains, Moltmann argues that while we know intimately the experience of dying--both our loved ones' dying and, ultimately, our own--death itself is a mystery. Are those who have died in fact dead? If the dead are alive, how or in what respect? When the dead awaken to eternal life, who wakes? Moltmann's interrogations yield surprising and beautiful fruits. The living soul that awakens to eternal life is not a ghost in a machine, but the Lebensgestalt, the shape and story of a life, its human and divine contexts, its "whole." Drawing on themes from his oeuvre's entire arc, Resurrected to Eternal Life testifies to the inner unity of Moltmann's theology: the cross, the Spirit, the kingdom, the end, and the hope that makes the end present here and now. Seasoned readers of Moltmann will find in these pages a capstone of a lifetime of theological exploration, while those new to his complex thought will find a concise and elegant entry point into his voluminous work."

Moltmann is, arguably, the most influential theologian alive today. Christ found him while he was in a British prisoner of war camp during WWII. The book, Resurrected to Eternal Life, is short—only 77 pages—but will definitely stimulate the way you think about resurrection.

At some point later in the summer or early fall, we will begin another book discussion using the book, The Cross and the Lynching Tree by James Cone. Plan to join us for that discussion as well.

LATE BOOMERS



Restoring Our Lord's House



LIVING INTO A CULTURE OF MISSION AND ACTION REPORT

Our team has been working with the survey results and meeting regularly to develop clarity about our identity as a congregation and to review our current mission statement and values. Listening to the survey responses is an integral part of that work.

The results of the congregational survey come from a nice cross section of our congregation. This is true in terms of three different aspects: worship service usually attended, frequency of worship, and length of time as a part of Our Lord's Lutheran. Of the 104 respondents, 41 attend the Saturday service, 43 attend the Sunday services (17 early service and 26 late service) and 20 rotate among the services. In terms of frequency of worship, 55% of all respondents worship weekly, 22% worship at OLLC two to three times per month. The remaining 23% split almost equally into three groups: once per month (7%), quarterly (8%), and less than once a quarter. 9% of those responding have been connected with OLLC less than three years. 6% have been engaged here between four and six years, 11% between seven and ten years, and 13% between eleven and fourteen years. 17% of the respondents have been active for fifteen to twenty years, and 44% for over 20 years.

The response to one question indicates both a challenge and an opportunity for our congregation. On the true or false statement: "When I think about my gifts, interests, and time, I often feel like I have something to offer our congregation but don't know how to do so", 30% of those responding said that is true for them. The challenge is we need to do a much better job of clearly and frequently sharing with the congregation the pathways for sharing skills, time, talents, and other resources. The opportunity is a significant portion of our members are ready to offer their gifts, interests, and time. Such sharing will enhance our life together as we emerge from the pandemic.

When prioritizing areas of congregational life, we found that across all three groups of worship service attendees, it is very clear that you want Youth and Family Ministry to be a priority at Our Lord's Lutheran.

We look forward to sharing more of the survey results with you in future columns and other forums.


