PASTOR'S COLUMN

"Bless sojourners and pilgrims who share this winding way; Your hope burns through the terrors, your love sustains the day." Bless Now, O God the Journey, ELW #326

We are one-third of the way through Lent. This month will end with Holy Week and Easter. We are making our way to Jerusalem where the central action will take place. As we travel through the stories of the covenants God made in the past, we are reminded that our ancestors in faith had winding journeys. The world around them was often full of threats. Holding on to their faith in the God who had initiated a relationship with them was far from easy.

Again and again, God took the initiative. Although each covenant has different expectations in terms of how people are to respond, it is God's action that is consistent through the centuries. In time, God took on flesh and blood and lived among us as a human being in the person of Jesus. He brought hope to those who were hurting. But he also angered a lot of religious and political leaders when he spoke out against the communal sins that hurt the vulnerable. His call to reflect, repent, learn, and grow was not always welcome.

His protests against institutional greed and abuses of power prompted the authorities to arrest him. He went to the cross where his blood was shed, and he died. But as you know, that was not the end of the story. Each gospel tells what happened on the third day in a slightly different manner. In Matthew, the earth shook, rocks split, tombs fell open. In Mark, the women left the tomb in terror, saying nothing to anyone. In John, the first knowledge of the new life won by Jesus came to Mary as she stood weeping outside the tomb. John's words will be the gospel we hear this year as we celebrate the resurrection. We will remember once again that God's love sustains life on Easter and every day.

So, dear People of God, I invite you to enter the stories of covenant each weekend. Let us journey through this month together. And then, on March 30th and 31st, come and celebrate as Mary encounters Jesus and runs to the disciples telling them "I have seen the Lord." We too have a chance to see the Lord, as Jesus brings life to us and to all people.

Peter's broken promises to never deny Jesus are restored by the surpassing love of Christ.


Week 5 of Lent — March 20

"Broken Justice Restored" • 2 Corinthians 5:20-21 A broken justice system put Jesus on the cross; we are restored when we are declared not guilty.



OLLC SOLAR ENERGY CONSIDERATION......UPDATE

On January 25 a group of 13 OLLC members met to discuss the potential of the church utilizing solar energy. Cost factors, practicality, and feasibility were discussed and several questions were posed. At this point, we are still waiting to receive final costs and answers to a few additional questions. Once all information has been received, documents describing the systems,



costs and the installation plan will be shared with the congregation via email. Two meeting times will be scheduled allowing opportunities for all members to ask questions about the solar project (meeting dates TBD). A congregational meeting will be held at least 30 days following the last scheduled meeting to conduct a congregational vote to determine if we should move forward with the project.

E-GIVING



Many people don't carry cash or a checkbook anymore. To make it easy for both visitors and members to express their generosity, OLLC offers multiple ways to give. You'll find that eGiving options are secure, fast and easy to use. Simply visit the church's donation page <ourlords.org> and donate using your credit or debit card. Another easy way to get started is to simply scan this QR code with your smart phone. The QR code takes you directly to the OLLC giving page. On the giving page you have the opportunity to identify if your contribution is for Benevolence (church expenditures) or for one of the designated funds associated with an Our Lord's ministry. Of course, cash or check are always welcomed. No matter how you choose to give, donations received will help us sustain our ministries throughout the year.



GIVING TO OLLC

Monies given to Our Lord's are divided into two categories--General Benevolence & Designated Giving.

- **General Benevolence (General Fund)** are dollars used for the operations of the church such as payroll, building expenses, insurances, utilities, administrative costs, building repairs, budgeted ministries, etc. Benevolence includes all items listed within the church budget. The spending plan (church budget) for 2024 totals \$344,096.
- **Designated Giving** includes all funds for which the donor identifies or 'designates' the fund receiving the dollars. A record of giving and expenditures within each of the designated funds is kept and reported monthly by the OLLC treasurer to the council. Balances of several designated funds are reported each month within the **Financial News** section of the monthly newsletter.

OLLC designated funds

(Balances for each fund as of 1/31/2023)

- **Building & Grounds Fund (\$4549)** Covers expenditures for the church buildings and grounds beyond budgeted building and repair expenses.
- Disaster Relief Fund (\$0) All funds received are paid directly to Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) for disaster relief.
 Donations to LDR make it possible to provide fast and effective support to communities in need, whenever and wherever a disaster may strike. All funds received are forwarded directly to LDR.
- **Elmwood Project (\$942)** OLLC conducts several ministries with Elmwood Nursing & Rehab -- Christmas with our Neighbors & Elmwood Bingo Items. Funds giving to Elmwood Project are used to serve the needs of Elmwood residents.
- **Fellowship After Church (\$514)** Fellowship is valued and supported at OLLC. With the addition of fellowship following Saturday worship, Sunday morning worship, and increasing numbers of special events the supplies for fellowship has increased. All monies from this account are used to purchase supplies such as coffee, creamers, cups, plates, plastic dinnerware, etc.
- Funeral Lunch (\$2,411) Funds defray cost of expenses from funeral luncheons.
- IT Fund (\$498) Pays for technology expenditures beyond budgeted items.
- Kitchen Team (\$341) Used for kitchen supplies such as cleaning products, trash bags, small appliances, serving
 utensils, etc.
- Memorial Funds (\$6,641) The OLLC Memorial Fund was established to provide for the receipt, recording and holding of
 memorial gifts. Gifts recorded in the Memorial Fund are used for needed items of lasting value to the church. A
 committee of four congregation members including the Pastor review requests and approve all memorial fund
 expenditures.
- Mind the Gap (\$752) Funds are used to serve the personal needs of people that are homeless.
- Musical Performance Traditional (\$350) Performance expenses and special equipment costs beyond dollars budgeted for Traditional Worship come from this account
- Our Lord's Youth (\$14,038) The majority of the funds in this account came from youth fundraisers to raise money to attend the Youth Gathering (held every 3 years). Due to COVID-19 and other interruptions, OLLC youth have not attended a Youth Gathering since 2018. In 2024, two youth & Pastor Darla Ann will be attending. Expenses for the trip are covered from this fund.
- People in a Pickle (\$669) Funds from this account are used to provide financial assistance (such as lodging, gas cards, meals or bus tickets) to people in need. Transient population, as well as homeless, in Madison and St. Clair Counties benefit from these funds. A committee of three congregation members assist with the application process, identification of need, and monitoring assistance provided.
- Pet Expo (\$0) Funds are used to pay for advertising, supplies, and other needs for the Pet Expo event in October.
- **Praise Band Performance (\$0)** Performance expenses and special equipment costs beyond dollars budgeted for the Praise Band come from this account.
- **S.O.S. Soup Kitchen (\$773)** funds are used to pay for food and other miscellaneous expenses related to S.O.S. Our Lord's host one meal each month. Costs total approx. \$400 per month.
- Thiel Estate (\$21,493) The funds from this account were given to Our Lord's by Harry & Lyn Thiel, longtime OLLC members. Harry and Lyn were passionate about working with the youth of the church and supporting them in their spiritual growth. In the spirit of Lyn & Harry, these funds are used to support projects and activities that encourage youth and young adults.

The Book Of Psalms Has For Centuries Been A Source Of Comfort, Consolation, And Encouragement For Jews And Christians. It Is Clearly A Spiritual Classic! The Spirituality Resourced By The Psalms Has Almost Always Been Individually-Focused And Often Meditative, And This Is Of Great Value. But The Psalms Can Do More, And These Sessions Will Explore How The Psalms Can Also Be A Resource For A More Activist, Outward-Looking Spirituality Oriented To Justice-Seeking And Peacemaking.

J. Clinton McCann, Jr. (Clint) is the Evangelical Professor of Biblical Interpretation at Eden Theological Seminary in Webster Groves, MO. He is a graduate of Davidson College (A. B.), Union Presbyterian Seminary (D. Min., Th. M.), and Duke University (Ph. D.). He was chair of the Psalms Section of the Society of Biblical Literature from 1989 to 1998, and much of Clint's research and writing has focused on the Book of Psalms. He is author of numerous books on the Psalms as well as many published articles and writings. including over 40 essays for workingpreacher.org that is a program of the Center for Biblical Preaching at Luther Seminary.

Dr McCann is a Teaching Elder (Ordained Minister) in the Presbyterian Church (USA) and member of the Presbytery of Giddings-Lovejoy. He has served as pastor for 10 years in North Carolina, as Resident Minister of the New Piasa Chautauqua near Elsah, IL; and he is an Associate Member of the Iona Community in Scotland which is committed to the pursuit of peace, justice, and the flourishing of creation.

The depth of his scholarship and his commitment to teaching from texts that inspire and inform people toward justice-seeking and peacemaking make this class a rich opportunity.

COUNCIL BRIEFS

I love the layering process involved when I create my 'thread paintings.' I begin with a plan for my work. The plan starts with a drawing; then, working on a backing fabric, I add hand-dyed fabric that has been cut and reassembled to create the image. When the design is done, I begin the process of adding machine stitching to complete the work. Throughout the creative process there are many decisions made regarding design, color, fabric, and composition. Often times there are dramatic changes when my original ideas do not work as planned. Despite setbacks, I am always moving forward.

Life at OLLC is similar. I think of the decisions and actions taken by the council, the ministry support team, and members are similar to that of a creative artist. Life at OLLC involves a process---making a plan, responding to changing circumstances, redesigning, and then reworking ideas as needed. Decisions are continually being evaluated and discussed, revisions made and changes put into place when determined appropriate, yet we are always moving forward.

The February Council meeting encompassed many topics of discussion; however, few action items. One topic of interest is the reinstatement of the Staff Support Team. This Team will meet with staff members to provide support and encouragement within his/her position. Erick Larson was the lead on this team prior to the pandemic and has agreed to lead the team once again. In addition, we discussed the review of the OLLC Mission, Vision, & Values. This document is used as the basis when many decisions. Adopted in 2021, it is time to review the mission, vision, values and priority areas within OLLC. In the next few months, a team will be assembled to discuss the church mission, vision, and values (see page 4 of the newsletter).

May God continue to bless our congregation as we make decisions and move forward fulfilling our mission. We ask that God grants us the wisdom to make wise decisions and the discernment to choose the right path.






