PASTOR'S COLUMN

But on the first day of the week, at early dawn, they went to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared. 2 They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, 3 but when they went in they did not find the body. Luke 24:1-3

Easter will soon be here. I am feeling so excited about its arrival this year. I have always loved the profound ritual actions we do together as a community of faith. Holy Week starts with the waving of palm branches and the shouting of "Hosanna." And it concludes with the first word of the resurrection, to which we all respond by shouting "Alleluia." In between we share a meal, pray as if we ourselves were with Jesus and the disciples in Gethsemane, remember Jesus' passion and crucifixion, and keep vigil as we wait for the news that those first disciples never anticipated.

As I was thinking about how the approaching celebration feels different to me this year, I realized part of it is that Easter is different every year. Unlike Christmas, its date changes. Sometimes it comes in March, sometimes at the beginning of April, and sometimes near the end of this month. This year, Easter comes quite late. That means we will see and smell the springtime blossoms before we celebrate Our Lord's resurrection. Sap rises, buds appear, and the scents of flowers fragrance the air. The days grow longer. All of this gives a lift to our emotions and our energy levels. So, while the resurrection of a human being is not natural, the new life coming from the earth as a part of its natural rhythm helps us feel more alive. And that allows us to enter into the difficult days of Holy Week trusting that, as we participate in the story of Christ's saving passion, we too will receive the shockingly good news of new life.

During the remaining days of the Season of Lent, Our Lord's Lutheran Church will continue to encourage special giving directed toward Lutheran Social Services of Illinois (LSSI). Donations assist LSSI to stay connected with Illinois residents and help them fulfill their Mission Statement of "Responding to the Gospel, Lutheran Social Services of Illinois brings healing, justice, and wholeness to people and communities."

Once Lent ends on Maundy Thursday, we turn our attention to our partnership with Collinsville Faith in Action. Faith in Action Sunday is April 26 & 27. We will have a speaker at both services that weekend and will encourage special offerings that weekend that are designated for FiA. We also have many members of this congregation who offer themselves as volunteers for Faith in Action.

Collinsville Faith in Action serves older adults and individuals with disabilities in the Collinsville, Caseyville, Maryville, and State Park area. Collinsville Faith in Action meets the needs of individuals in the community by providing services that are often seen as life-changing by care receivers. The services offered include transportation, grocery shopping, companionship, respite for the family, minor home repairs, seasonal yard maintenance, social outings with other care receivers, Medicare enrollment assistance, Benefits Access (license plate discount and bus passes), and information about other possible benefits that are available. All of these services are provided at no charge.













"Lenten Worship through the Senses" with Holden Evening Prayer Wednesdays at 6:30 pm

Our five senses are a way of exploring the significance of Christ's incarnation throughout our Lenten journey. We all are made in the image of God, who chose to share our humanity by joining in our embodied experience. Meditation stations and the lighting of handheld candles at each service will deepen our experience of the ways God comes to us in worship.

Mid-week services usually last between 35 and 45 minutes.

The writers then bring their diverse voices and pastoral wisdom to the texts with quotations to ponder, reflections, and prayers.

Periodically burning native prairie habitat is vital to maintaining its health and functionality (every 2-3 years). Prairie grasses and flowers are built differently than turf grass, weeds, or invasive species. While traditional turf grass has roots that stretch around 2 inches deep, the roots of native prairie plants can dig up to 15 feet! These roots not only hold the plant and soil in place, but they allow the plant to prosper through above-ground disturbances like fires.

Prairie plant's ability to survive periodic fires is vital because in the early spring when all types of plants are emerging from a long winter, weeds and invasive species can often grow quicker and can out-compete prairie plants over time. This leads to the native grasses and flowers competing with weeds and other unsightly plants for nutrients, light, and space. By burning the above-ground vegetation in early spring, weeds and other annual plants are set back to give room for the hardy, preferred prairie plants below.

In addition to the direct benefits to the plants inhabiting prairies, prescribed burns also restore nutrients to the soil and prevent uncontrolled burns from happening due to excessive dry plant matter.

Charles Edward Miller Obituary December 17, 1930 - March 4, 2025

Charles Edward Miller, age 94, of McHenry, Illinois, lived life fully and passed away peacefully surrounded by his loving family on March 4, 2025. He was born on December 17, 1930, in Grapeville, Pennsylvania, to Charles Harvey and Violet Theresa Miller. He married Fay Ann Taylor, his wife of 57 years, on May 19, 1956, at the Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Jeannette, Pennsylvania. Charles received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Newberry College in South Carolina in 1954. In 1958 he received a Bachelor of Divinity degree from the Evangelical Lutheran Seminary in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. He was ordained by the Pittsburgh Synod of the United Lutheran Church in America on October 19, 1958, in Holy Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church, Jeannette, Pennsylvania.

His ministry of more than 60 years began in Manorville, Pennsylvania where he served three congregations in the Manorville Parish – Christ Lutheran Church, Emmanuel Lutheran Church and Grace Lutheran Church. In 1961 he accepted a Call to serve the Aspinwall Evangelical Lutheran Church in Aspinwall, Pennsylvania. A mission congregation, Our Lord's Lutheran Church in Collinsville, Illinois, called him in 1967 to serve this new congregation. He served there until February 1980, when he accepted a Call to Saint Stephen Lutheran Church in Antioch, Illinois, retiring in 1998. From 1999-2019 he served part-time at the Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church, McHenry, Illinois.

Charles Miller's life was a testament to the impact one person can have on the lives of many. COUNCIL BRIEFS

I recently began making a new quilt. Typically I create designs by assembling random colors and threads and allowing the image to develop as the work progresses. This quilt began in a more traditional manner. I started by gathering vintage embroidered quilt squares as the foundation for my quilt, I chose a variety fabrics to compliment the embroidery then drafted several ideas and eventually determined a beginning design. As I assembled fabric pieces along side the embroidered squares I re-evaluated the sizes of each piece, the shapes and fabrics to use, and considered how contrasting tones altered the design. My ideas frequently changed and I re-cut fabrics, ripped out seams, and started again during the creative process.

A quilt begins as a vision held in the mind of the quilter. The pieces come together to create a whole-the whole being stronger and more telling than its individual parts. The dark pieces provide contrast to the lighter ones. Colors that might not stand out all on their own suddenly pop because of their placement next to a complementary one. One shape may be larger than others to create emphasis. Small shapes are assembled to create larger shapes and patterns are repeated for continuity. Just as a quilt is a result of choices, life, too, is a series of choices and decisions.


